If you like history and mysteries and good story telling you need to read this book. I am deeply involved with vintage aircraft and my favorite book on this topic is *Final Flight* by Peter Stekel. Peter is not an aviation historian and that is his greatest strength. He has picked stories of human drama and tragedy from his beloved Sierra Nevada Mountains which happen to involve the loss of aircraft. His meticulous research uncovers the stories behind the accidents and his description of the investigation is as fascinating as his conclusions.

Beneath Haunted Waters has all the appeals of *Final Flight* and more above. It tells the story of two enormous bombers of World War II with large crews that were lost in the High Sierra, the second searching for the first, and which both found their final resting places at the bottom of lonely lakes. The loss of thousands of young people in aircraft crashes across the United States during World War II is a sadly forgotten strand of history. Producing a myriad of aircrew for a global conflict required hundreds of thousands of training flights in the USA. During this endeavors thousands of young trainees died as a result of mistakes, mechanical failures and simple bad luck.

In *Beneath Haunted Waters* Peter weaves a wonderful story around the discovery and investigation of the two lost planes over several decades. He meticulously researched the individual lives of all the lost aviators which brings poignancy to the story of the lives cut short. As in *Final Flight* he also gained an impressive knowledge of the relevant aircraft, flying conditions and other challenges that probably caused these tragedies. This book will appeal to a wide range of readers from those who enjoy the splendor and natural history of the mountain back country to those who are aficionados of aviation or World War II. It is evocative, educational and a flat out good read.
